# IVC Foundation Awards Over \$730,00 During 38th Scholarship Award Ceremony



The 38th Scholarship Award Ceremony of the IVC Foundation was celebrated on May 19. The IVC Foundation granted 667 scholarships, amounting to more than \$527,000, which is \$50,000 more than last year. In addition, \$34,850 in emergency funds, \$16,000 in bookstore vouchers, and \$153,887 from outside agencies were awarded to students. Overall, IVC students were supported with over \$733,537. The ceremony was attended by scholarship recipients, representatives,

trustees, leadership, faculty, staff, and administrators of the SOCCCD. The ceremony featured inspiring speeches from distinguished individuals, including two accomplished IVC students and award recipients, Randy Ramon Suarez and Justine Gotico, and the remarkable Fumiko Ishii, whose generous scholarships have helped numerous students achieve their dreams. The ceremony reflects the strong community support for the Foundation's mission, emphasizing the value of education and the importance of investing in students' academic success.

# Columbia University Studies IVC as Model of Excellence for Guided Pathways



IVC and Santa Barbara City College are being studied by Columbia University's Community College Research Center as a model of excellence for successfully implementing the Guided Pathways Completion Team inquiry and action process. This model has shown to be effective in improving student outcomes and helping students achieve their academic goals. Several Completion Team leads were

interviewed by the research team. Columbia is looking to create a best practice guide for other community colleges wanting to develop similar teams. IVC's contribution has the potential to help many other institutions improve their student success rates and create more equitable pathways to higher education.

## Promoting a Safe and Inclusive Community During Sexual Assault Awareness Week



From April 24-28, the campus commemorated <u>Sexual Assault Awareness Week (SAAW)</u> to increase awareness among its campus community. The college hosted various workshops, including a Mental Health Resource Fair that provided a safe space for attendees to explore on- and off-campus resources. The week-long program covered pertinent topics, such as understanding situational awareness, linking oppression to sexual assault and harassment, and supporting gender inclusivity for queer and trans students. ## Office of Student Equity Hosts Spring Meal Distribution



On May 4, the college hosted a grab-and-go event with 500 meals distributed to students. Each student received a meal and had the opportunity to pack a grocery bag with additional pantry and produce items. Over 3,000 pantry items were provided to students. IVC Cares meal distributions occur throughout the academic year to assist in providing food and information on the Basic Needs program at the college. The theme was "May the 4th Be With You," a wordplay referencing the popular movie franchise "Star Wars." Meal

## Erin Pollard presents on Gender-Affirming Mental Health Care in connection with California's AB 132



On May 2, Manager of Student Equity Programs Erin Pollard was invited to present for the California Community Colleges Foundation office as part of the LGBTQ+ programming in connection with AB 132. The presentation focused on Gender-Affirming Mental Health Care. Research has shown that individuals who receive gender-affirming mental health care have better mental health outcomes and overall quality of life. By actively participating in initiatives such as AB 132 and providing resources and training on topics related to LGBTQ+ health and well-

being, IVC is working to create a more welcoming and supportive environment for all students.

## **Center for Teaching Excellence Selected to Receive Funding**



The college was selected to receive technical assistance from a full Partnership Resource Team through the California Community Colleges Institutional Effectiveness Partnership Initiative (IEPI) for Fall 2023. The support and funding will be used to establish a Center for Teaching Excellence (CTX). The CTX will be a physical hub for professional development, and a place for instructors to learn and exchange disciplinary and cross-disciplinary best practices. The proposed CTX will enhance teaching effectiveness to support student success; encourage collaboration and community to build a shared vision around professional

development; provide a centralized location of faculty resources; promote the use of data, inquiry, and evidence to enable action and thoughtful innovation; and support faculty to adapt to changing needs. The CTX will be valuable to IVC as it aligns with the college's and state's goals for improving equity and student outcomes.

#### IVC Honored for Excellence in Equitable Course Placement and Implementation of AB 705 Legislation



On April 26, IVC was recognized by the Campaign for College Opportunity as one of 56 California community colleges excelling in equitable course placement. The college was honored for being a leading campus in implementing AB 705, legislation to improve student access and success with transfer-level English and math coursework.

IVC was specifically recognized for its campuswide English enrollment, having successfully supported 100% of students to enroll directly in transfer-level English coursework. Equitable course placement is crucial to ensure that students have equal access to educational opportunities and academic success, and this recognition reflects the campus' commitment to providing students with the support they need to succeed.

## IVC Students Participate in the 23rd Annual UCI Community College Honors Research Conference



Fifty-six IVC students, supported by the IVC Honors Program, participated in the 23rd Annual UCI Community College Honors Research Conference. IVC students delivered 23 oral and 19 poster presentations, comprising 42 of the 224 research projects presented—the greatest number out of the 29 participating colleges statewide. Under the

guidance of IVC faculty mentors, students worked hard to conduct research, write proposal abstracts, and prepare their posters or oral presentations. Anna Dupree and Dee Bao's project, "Seven Billion Alaskan Snow Crabs Vanished: What Happened?", completed under the mentorship of Math Professor Lan Pham, won 1st place for STEM posters. Another IVC group project won an Outstanding Abstract Award for "Utilizing Machine Learning Algorithms Trained on Recent Music-Listening Activity in Predicting Big Five Personality Traits: A Novel Ongoing Investigation." Fourteen additional IVC students participated in the conference by volunteering to moderate Q&A during oral presentation sessions, and IVC Honors Director Emily Liu served as the conference's program chair on behalf of the Honors Transfer Council of California.

## IVC Honors Program Celebrates Achievements of Graduating Students at Awards Ceremony



The IVC Honors Program held its Awards Ceremony on May 12, where 246 graduating students who fulfilled program requirements were recognized. At the event, graduating Honors students announced their transfer institutions, shared what they gained from their time at IVC, and received an Honors medallion from President Hernandez. The

## The Model United Nations (MUN) Team Stands Out at Los Angeles MUN



The MUN team attended Los Angeles MUN from April 13-16, competing against several prestigious four-year universities, including Harvard, Georgetown, University of Chicago, Claremont McKenna College, University of Southern California, and the University of

California, Berkeley. The team consisted of nine students who discussed challenges and solutions to issues such as autonomous lethal weapons and the developing country commodity trap. The team won Diplomatic Commendation awards in two of the three committees. IVC was one of only six colleges to win an award at the event, making it the only community college to receive this honor.

#### Students Attend CSU Long Beach & UC Irvine Campus Tour and Presentation



The Transfer Center organized a campus tour and presentation at California State University, Long Beach, and the University of California, Irvine, for students involved in several programs, including Puente, EOPS,

Guardian Scholars, Honors, and Black Student Success Scholars. Thirty-eight students attended the event on April 14, and 33 completed a survey reporting they better understand transfer requirements and resources available at these universities. This activity helps students explore potential transfer options and gain valuable insights into the transfer process.

# Students Explore Latin American Art and Culture During Museum Visit



Professor Beatrice Tseng and her Spanish 1 Honors students visited the Long Beach Museum of Latin American Art. The tour detailed the meaning and historical background behind several works of art. In the exhibit, were paintings and sculptures by two renowned artists: Yolanda Gonzalez, a Chicana artist whose art is a fusion of Latina culture and

Japanese aesthetics, and Fernando Botero, an artist from Colombia whose artwork exalts volume and beauty in exhibits all over the world. The visit to the museum exposed students to new cultures, ideas, and forms of expression, a great example of experiential learning as a valuable supplement to classroom instruction.

# Puente Students Explore California State University, Visit Art Museum, and Volunteer at Food Bank



Puente students recently took part in a campus tour of California State University, Fullerton (CSUF), visited The Cheech Riverside Art Museum, and volunteered at the OC Food Bank. One morning, the students were able to explore CSUF and learn more about the university's programs and resources.
